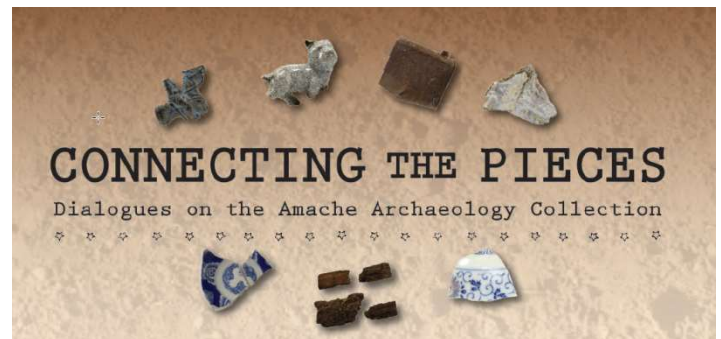
The Archaeology of Japanese American Confinement in Colorado”

This event, presented in partnership between Creighton University, Omaha JACL and the Archaeology Institute of America, features a **lecture** by Bonnie Clark, Ph.D., University of Denver, and includes corresponding **travelling exhibit** and **artifacts**.

The forced removal and subsequent incarceration of over 120,000 people of American of Japanese descent during World War II is a pivotal yet often misunderstood incident in world history. The sites of this confinement are significant resources for both research about and re-engagement with this critical, yet shadowed experience. Since 2008, Dr. Bonnie Clark has led collaborative archaeological investigations at the site of Amache, Colorado’s War Relocation Authority confinement facility. In this talk Clark will discuss the ongoing project, highlighting insights about the camp’s cultural landscape and the strategies of a confined people to reknit community and reclaim humanity.
